OBITUARY - TERENCE (TERRY) O'CONNOR

It is my great privilege to have known Terry O'Connor, Enniscorthy, County Wexford, and formerly of Blackrock and Deansgrange, County Dublin, who died recently following a long illness. It was shortly after my arrival here that I first met Terry in the Deanery offices when he was delivering some printing which his firm had provided for Saint Patrick's. I was struck immediately by his friendly and genial manner, his willingness to be of help, as well as his craftsmanship and skill – all laced with his distinctive sense of humour.

Terry was always ably supported by his wife, Anne, who were married in Saint Patrick's Cathedral, and for whom the cathedral always had special importance and significance. Anne is a regular worshipper at the cathedral, and it was very fitting that, courtesy of Mr Stuart Nicholson, Master of the Music, the Cathedral Choir sang, via recordings, at Terry's funeral in Saint Mary's Church, Enniscorthy. The funeral address was given by a life-long friend of Terry – another Terry(!) – the Reverend Terry Lilburn, who was actually a former business partner and colleague of Terry.

Many thanks to the Dean's Vicar, Canon Charles Mullen, who represented the Dean, and Terry's many friends from Saint Patrick's, at the funeral service at Mount Jerome.

We extend our deepest condolences to Anne, and to her family, in their time of bereavement.

DEAN'S GIFT DAY

For well over 30 years the Dean's Annual Gift Day has proved of enormous benefit to Saint Patrick's through its focus in raising much needed funds for initiatives that have greatly improved the fabric of the cathedral. While, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, it was not possible last year to host Gift Day in the traditional manner in the cathedral, the appeal realised the amazing sum of €43,006.43 which will be utilised to enhance greatly the sound quality of the live stream system. As soon as restrictions ease sufficiently, tenders will be sought for this work which will be carried out as soon as possible.

The Dean wishes to acknowledge the huge generosity of all who contributed to the Gift Day last year; many individuals contributed very generously to the appeal, and sincere thanks are expressed to them each one. The sum raised includes two major donations of €5000 each − one in June, the other in December − from The Friends of Saint Patrick's Cathedral, as well as £6900 which was awarded as a result of a grant application to All Churches Trust, the charitable section of Ecclesiastical Insurance, to whom we are also hugely indebted.

Interestingly, the focus of the Dean's Gift Day Appeal 2021 remains on worship. In 2020 the aim was to provide much better quality of sound for listeners who, either because of restrictions during the pandemic, or the preclusion of attending the cathedral due to physical distance in general, would join with us on live stream. This year, with the return of a congregation (even though there is a restriction at present on the number attending), we are hoping to attend to the conservation of a number of features of the cathedral:

- The re-adaptation of the choir stall candle lights from oil burning to LED lighting. These lights were kindly donated by Dean Griffin, and his family, in memory of his late wife, Daphne.
- The refurbishment of the pew runners. The latter, which were removed and placed in storage during lockdown, thus allowing the sanitisation of pews, will be reintroduced when restrictions permit.
- The repair, or re-upholstery, of the kneelers in the cathedral.
- The repair of the locks in the box pews.

Regarding this year's appeal, Dean Morton said: "I am deeply conscious of your faithful giving to this appeal over the years, and to so many other good causes as well; I assure you, your support will be deeply appreciated in conserving these features of Saint Patrick's Cathedral to the glory of God, and for the benefit of worshippers now and in the future."

This year's Gift Day Appeal will be held on Saturday 26 June. If you would like to contribute in person on that day you will be most welcome to avail of some refreshments in the Deanery garden between 11.00 a.m. and 1.00 p.m. when strawberries and cream, and a glass of prosecco/soft drinks will be served. This will comply with government restrictions. If the weather is not favourable, plan B will be implemented (adhering to all the precautions) in the Lady Chapel. THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES

It is now early June and I am pleased to say the slating of the upper roofs is complete. The delay to the internal works caused by the last lockdown means that the new walkways and fire safety upgrades must still be completed. In addition, the great clerestory windows are being installed, following their conservation, as the scaffolding is dismantled and removed. Their reveals need to be chalk blasted to remove the accumulated layers of carbon and dirt which have built up over the years. This is proving to be a slow and challenging process, carried out as it is by skilled technicians, and so it is likely that the practical completion date for the whole project may now be in late August, if not early September.

This project has been a very significant milestone in the long story of the Cathedral and we hope, restrictions permitting, that we can all meet together within the building to mark this historic event at some stage in the first half of September.

Happily, the Cathedral is now open for visitors and well as worshippers. Great credit is due to Louis and his team for ensuring the Cathedral is presented as beautifully as possible and for creating a safe environment in accordance with Government guidelines for those who wish to spend time here. Of course, we expect very few visitors until the slow resumption of international travel later in the year. Given the seasonal nature of tourism, we operated in a deficit situation through the winter until early March. Though challenges abound we are not without hope as we all look to the return of normality in the coming months. **GHW**

THE HISTORY PROJECT-MONUMENTS IN FOCUS

The blue door of the Cathedral Choir School is a familiar sight to anyone who has walked the Cathedral Close. The door has become a symbol of the cathedral's impressive musical tradition, the resilience of which is embodied by the plaque which states 'founded in 1432AD'. Despite the central role the Choir School plays in the daily worship of the cathedral, the school's founder, Archbishop Richard Talbot (1386-1449), is often overlooked.

Appointed Archbishop of Dublin in 1418, Talbot played a considerable role in Irish political and ecclesiastical life. He held significant titles such as Lord Chancellor of Ireland, and Chief Governor of Dublin. His ambition and success caused a feud to develop between Talbot and another leading Irish figure, the Duke of Ormond, a feud which, often violent, continued between the families for generations.

His tenure as Archbishop was not one of great success, with the coffers of the Dublin diocese in serious want of funds upon his death. One lasting achievement of his career however was the establishment of the charter of minor canons and choristers in Saint Patrick's Cathedral in 1431, the official establishment of the Choir School. The school has continued to educate the cathedral choristers for nearly 600 years, only interrupted during the Cromwellian period.

Talbot died in 1449 and was buried, quite appropriately, in the quire area. His resting place was marked by a brass likeness set in stone, which was sadly lost to time after many centuries. In 1902 the stone was discovered, and upon the request of Dean John Henry Bernard a new brass was made, modelled off a surviving sketch of the original. While the image of Talbot accompanied by singers is often out of view for visitors, and occasionally covered, his true memorial can be heard through the music of daily worship.

'I am very excited about this new opportunity. It is a great honour to be part of a tradition of verging in this Cathedral dating back centuries. I have settled very nicely into the community and hope to be here for many years to come."

Initially working at the Gift Shop, Aaron was then appointed as a Cathedral Verger in January 2019. 
