

You may have read in the RTÉ Guide for 04–10th May the interesting feature written by Donal O'Donoghue



He has been a regular speaker at the annual Christmas Party of The Friends of Saint Patrick's Cathedral.

In wishing Bryan well for retirement, I also thank him for his tremendous support of the Cathedral, and to me personally, for his kindness, graciousness, and encouragement. Bryan is a person who always makes time for others, and who always has a cheery word for members of the congregation, as he has for those worshipping with us as visitors.

# THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES...

Mr Gavan Woods

here are over seventy employees here at Saint Patrick's Cathedral at present. Our roles and tasks are varied as you would expect in an organisation involved in such a diverse range of activities. It may be obvious, but our staff are core to our ability to function as a place of worship, deliver community and education programmes, care for our buildings, and much more besides. It is easy to take this for granted.

In our strategic plan for 2020-2025, the Board set out the ambition that we would become certified by the organisation *Great Place to Work*. As luck would have it, two years ago, Fáilte Ireland developed their *Employers Excellence Programme* for the tourist industry, which included just such certification.

Ms Barbara Whelan, our Human Resource Manager, was tasked with leading our engagement with this programme in 2023. There was considerable work involved for many in the team here, particularly for the supervisors and managers. Significant training and upskilling was required of them as part of the certification process.

Included, too, was the rollout of a detailed questionnaire amongst the wider staff exploring satisfaction levels across a broad range of metrics involving their work here. We needed to ensure that at least 65% of employees engaged fully with this questionnaire and I am pleased to say we surpassed this target.

The results of the survey were collated and used to create a detailed report by the people at *Great Place to Work*, which benchmarked our performance against the wider sector. An occupational psychologist then met with me and some of the staff team to explain and contextualise the results earlier this year. I am delighted to say that the Cathedral achieved gold level accreditation, which is the highest possible. Nonetheless there is work to do. Not all cohorts

across the team experienced similar levels of satisfaction in key areas such as management communication and career progression. One or two departments recorded particularly low levels of engagement with the survey, perhaps showing the results to be more positive than they actually are.

As part of the programme, which runs for three years, we have been supplied with external HR support to help us to improve in the areas we score lowest. Over the next month, I will meet with all staff in small groups to consider what we need to stop, start, or continue doing to make meaningful changes to their roles here. Over the next quarter, we will commence a new appraisal process which will help to ensure that there is strong communication across the organisation in the years ahead.

It is, as they say, a hard life. As we achieved such strong results, we were shortlisted for recognition at the annual black tie award ceremony held at the Lyrath Estate in Kilkenny earlier this month. Barbara and I attended on behalf of the team.

We were unlucky on the night and did not find ourselves amongst the winners but it was a pleasure to be there nonetheless, representing the Cathedral at the very top tier of the tourism sector.

#### OBITUARY

mong the worshippers at the Easter Sunday Eucharist in 2019 were two gentlemen from Saint Thomas's Church, Fifth Avenue, New York. At the close of the service, we had a brief conversation about Church life on our respective sides of the Atlantic. As we parted, we exchanged e-mail addresses with a view to keeping in touch, and what - at that time - was a faint glimmer of hope that we might be able to organise a choir trip to New York. Within less than a year, the Covid-19 virus had struck. One wet and dismal Saturday in July 2020, when the roof project was seven months underway and no income to finance the initiative, I e-mailed our friends to trawl ideas about the possibility of international funding. Several e-mails and telephone calls later, I was delighted to hear from Henry Cox and Michael Kunkel that they had decided to come and live in Dun Laoghaire, and, even better, that they were going to join our congregation. They did, and we thank them for their tremendous support of Saint Patrick's Cathedral.

Tragically, Henry was diagnosed with a terminal illness, and on Wednesday 17th April, we received from Michael the news we never wanted to hear – that Henry had died. We are hoping to offer thanksgiving for his life in the Office of Matins in Saint Patrick's Cathedral on Sunday 26th May at 11:15.

Henry was a most faithful and dedicated member of the congregation.

He had many fine Christian attributes - kindness, generosity, thoughtfulness, friendship, humility - the list goes on. He was a gifted musician and loved the musical and choral traditions of Saint Patrick's Cathedral. Hospitality always featured prominently and Henry's and Michael's home was always open to family, friends, musicians, composers, artists, and writers. They commissioned music for cello and flute, and for chamber choirs; they sponsored concerts, events, and concert series, along with commissioning art pieces for their collection. Henry thrived on helping artists in all fields; he delighted in connecting people to opportunities and each other.

We will miss Henry's graciousness, friendship, empathy, and encouragement. May he rest in peace and be raised in glory. We extend our sincere condolences to Michael; to Henry's sister, Charlotte; to his uncle, Roy; to the wider family circle; and to Henry's and Michael's many dear friends on both sides of the Atlantic. ## EDUCATION DEPARTMENT MR CLARK BRYDON

Pollowing months of painfully slow brainstorming, designing, editing, and printing, we are finally seeing the fruits of the Interpretation Committee's labours in our new visitor welcome leaflets. To use a disgustingly corporate term, these will come 'on stream' in various languages as we use up the old stock. This marks a fundamental change in the Cathedral's visitor engagement policy, in that we have removed most of the information from the leaflet.

'How ever will the visitor learn about Jonathan Swift?!' I hear you cry. Well, most of the information is duplicated on the very stylish panels around the Cathedral. The essays in the old leaflet were lengthy, difficult to read due to their small text, and only available in a small number of languages. Furthermore, people found it difficult to explore the

Cathedral because the map was not particularly conducive to navigation. We have made the new map easier to read, so that people can find the various sections of the building (most notably the toilets), and the audio guide and panel numbers (most notably number two) more easily.

Rutwhat about the Inst information? Is it now only available in English on the panels?' No. Given how global our visitor demographic is, we now have all the information (and more!) available in practically every language in the world. Over the course of the last two years, I have been slowly, bit-by-bit, developing a new interactive platform: the Pilgrim Portal. This is an easy-to-use visitor experience website, with all the things one could possibly need for a visit to Saint Patrick's Cathedral. Whether it is the audio guides, panels, maps, prayers, or orders of services, it is all there in one place, easily accessible from any mobile device, without the need to download any apps. From the photo here, you can see just how simple the layout is. Despite being a PhD student, I have an aversion to words! The fewer words, the better.

Simply scan the QR code at the entrance or input the web address, and it all appears. And – through the magic of *Google Translate* – all the text is automatically available in any language. Google's translation service has improved significantly in recent years, offering an almost-perfect translation in the majority of widely spoken languages. With the free wi-fi available in the Cathedral, it does not cost any more in data fees for a visitor from outside the European Union.

Despite having a good number of audio guide units, we have not been able to offer them to organised group tours, as we would simply run out for our individual and family visitors. Now, anyone can listen to the audio guide on their own device, using their own earphones. Although we take all precautions and clean each physical unit after use, some people would still rather avoid touching something that dozens of others have also touched that day.

For visitors who have a strong grasp of the English language, but come across a word or phrase on a panel that they do not know, they can simply scan the QR code on the panel to be taken straight to a translation.

It is not just for non-English speakers though. The *Pilgrim Portal* seamlessly incorporates our digital orders of service. For each Choral Matins, Evensong, and Eucharist services, all the

text is there in a bespoke service sheet. If you have ever come to a midweek Evensong and wondered what the text of the anthem being sung by the Cathedral Choir was, you would now be able to find out. Thousands of people tune into our live stream and follow the order of service on the Pilgrim Portal every year. All of the readings, collects, and congregational words are there - and, of course, it is all translatable into any language. Our worship does most of the speaking and explaining for us - as it has done for centuries - but, for some, being able to discover more in their own language at their fingertips will bring them, in that moment, closer to God.

This might all sound like a sales pitch, but I am very keen that the Cathedral utilises technology to its fullest. In a post-Covid world, most of the people visiting the Cathedral today are more technologically literate than ever before. We are a living, breathing church, not just a monument to the past. So if we can enable more people to learn more about our faith and story using this very simple and cheap method, then that is not an opportunity to be missed.

I strongly encourage you to explore the *Pilgrim Portal*. If you would like to discuss how you could bring this to your church, don't hesitate to get in touch.

## **CONSERVATION NEWS**



he conservation works over the last year have seen the Cathedral's collection come under the spotlight, with several items receiving the VIP treatment of specialist care, which has – in turn – revealed hidden stories about the artefacts. As part of these ongoing works, the renowned Dr Claudia Kinmonth, an expert in historic furnishings, is undertaking a review of the Deanery inventory, and has already uncovered some interesting hidden histories. One such example was an



unsuspecting bowl of pinecones, which – upon further inspection – was revealed to be a historic butter bowl, possibly sourced from a local historic dairy farm. Dr Kinmonth also spotted an eighteenth-century chair hidden away under modern upholstery, and a number of unassuming items which likely date back to the time of Dean Jonathan Swift. We look forward to the completed report, and the interesting and hidden treasures Dr Kinmonth is bound to uncover.

Aaron Hoey is a Chapter Verger and also a leading figure on the Cathedral's Conservation Committee. This committee is responsible for the day-to-day management of the countless historic items within the Cathedral and Deanery, reguluarly tending to textile, paper, and furniture care and maintenance. The necessary work to the buildings themselves are also discussed due to the impact on the artefacts and how best to manage any larger-scale conservation projects. In order for our visitors to engage with and fully understand these items, the Interpretation Committee was formed, which primarily deals with the display of items, signage around them, the stories about them, and the wayfinding around the building. 
