

## THE DEAN WRITES...

THE VERY REVD DR WILLIAM MORTON

tched indelibly in my mind over all the Remembrance services I have had the privilege to take part in are the extremely moving words written by Dr John McCrea, a serving Major and second in command of the 1st Brigade Canadian Field Artillery.

It is thought that Dr John McCrae (30th November 1872 — 28th January 1918) began the draft for his famous poem 'In Flanders Fields' on the evening of the 2nd May, 1915 in the second week of fighting during the Second Battle of Ypres.

It is believed that the death of his friend, Alexis Helmer, was the inspiration for Dr McCrae's poem 'In Flanders Fields'. The exact details of when the first draft was written may never be known because there are various accounts by those who were with Dr McCrae at that time. Here are his lovely words:

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:

To you from failing hands we throw The torch; he yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

Two lines, in particular, are striking. "To you from failing hands we throw the torch; be yours to lift it high." Dr McCrea, I believe, realised that, as sadly and tragically turned out to be the case, there would be many more, himself included, who would not come out of the war alive. He is saying that it is the duty of those who will come after him, and after them, to contend with the foe. Yes, he probably did think of the foe being the enemy against whom they were fighting, but isn't the enemy – very importantly for us in 2024 – any 'foe,' including prejudice, disease,

poverty, hunger, ignorance, crime and intolerance?


It is our duty to stand up for truth, goodness, honesty and all the qualities which at times seem to be in diminishing supply.

May your experience of Remembrance-tide this year be one of thoughtfulness and action towards creating a better world. Never has the need been greater to pray for peace. May God be with the thousands who have been bereaved, and injured, in the Holy Lands, and those who suffer in Ukraine, Syria, Sudan, Somalia, Libya, and all other troubled areas.



# THE ADMINISTRATOR WRITES...

Mr Gavan Woods

s previously reported, following a detailed tendering process I am delighted to announce that we have appointed Kelbuild, a first-class conservation contractor, to undertake the refurbishment and repurposing of the Deanery Mews building. This major project will involve a complete renewal of the building with the exception of the external walls. New access routes between the Cathedral and the Mews will be created along the west end of the Deanery garden. The contract was formally signed on 24th October by the Dean and Michael Kelly, Managing Director at Kelbuild.

The works are expected to take a full year to complete and will provide a new home for the music department through the provision of three state of the art tuition rooms and a fully kitted out classroom upstairs. Downstairs there will be a multipurpose space capable of seating seventy persons together with a kitchenette and toilets. We envisage this area will be heavily used by out community and education departments to facilitate their many important activities. The Mews will also serve as an area where our congregation can gather after service and chat, away from the busy Cathedral.

All our conservation projects are undertaken with sustainability in mind, though ensuring historic structures are energy efficient can be both challenging and costly. The Mews floor will be ceramic tiles on top of an innovative product containing crushed glass with a high insulative quality and the internal walls will be rendered with a lime plaster containing minute pieces of cork, again to ensure thermal efficiency. A passive ventilation system has been devised to enable good throughput of fresh air in the building and a new roof between the Mews and the adjacent services block will carry photovoltaic panels. The building will be heated when required by state of the art ultra efficient smart electric panel

heaters. The calculations show that over the course of a year the building will generate more energy than it is likely to use.

The existing historic windows and louvers will be retained and repaired by a master joiner and the yard upon which the Mews fronts will become a beautiful space, again providing a gathering area for our congregation when the weather is fine.

Great credit is due to the Deanery architects, Howley Hayes Cooney, for the wonderful scheme they have so painstakingly devised and most especially Fionnuala, the project

architect, and Ingrid the chief designer. A formidable technical team have been involved from the start and have been immensely engaged and responsive through the design and planning stages. Interactive Project Managers, who oversaw the delivery of the roof project, have been appointed by the Board to oversee the project and to help ensure that it is completed on time and within budget.

We look forward to bringing this space into active use in a year's time and welcoming you all to the opening!

## DENIS WILLIAM CAMPBELL WALSH

#### **OBITUARY**

enis, who was a most regular and frequent worshipper in Saint Patrick's at the Sunday 9.15am Holy Communion, will be greatly missed by his many friends at that service, and by all who had the privilege of knowing him. Denis died peacefully in the loving care of his family, and the staff of Beaumont Hospital, on 18th October. When leaving Denis on what turned out to be my last visit to him in hospital before his death, his parting words to me were, "tell all my friends I am thinking of them." Denis was a true Christian gentleman of great faith who personified kindness, goodness, truth, honesty, integrity, sincerity, and concern for others. We shall miss him dearly.

It was a serendipitous journey which led to Denis becoming a member of the congregation of Saint Patrick's. He, and his wife June, who he first met as a pupil with him at Greenlanes National School, Clontarf, were married in 1960 and went to live in Raheny where they made many lifelong friends. They were active members of All Saints' Church, where Denis served as a churchwarden. and member of the Select Vestry, was involved in the Healer Prayer Circle, ran the Cub Scout group in the parish, organised the annual summer fete / strawberry fayre, and went carol singing at Christmas! About thirty years ago, when June's mother, who had been

living with Denis and June for some time, could no longer be left on her own while they were at church, Denis decided to worship in Saint Patrick's early on Sunday mornings, thus allowing June to attend the later service in All Saints. It was a decision which, as Denis would say often, rekindled his love of the Cathedral tradition, bearing in mind that he had been a chorister in Christ Church Cathedral when he was a pupil in the school there. How he loved attending the major choral highlights like the Festival of Nine Lessons And Carols, and other occasions as well. Denis was extremely supportive of, and generous to, the many appeals and fund-raising initiatives in Saint Patrick's Cathedral. He also enjoyed the time he spent stewarding visitors in the Cathedral.

Denis loved Scouting and spent all his summer holidays camping in Powerscourt, only cycling home to gather together whatever food he could find to keep him going until the next visit! In Powerscourt he developed a love nature and wildlife which stayed with him all his life. In recent years he would take his binoculars down to the Wooden Bridge and watch the sea birds.

Denis's other great love was his garden where he cultivated tomatoes, loganberries and raspberries, continuing in June's tradition of making jam.

The funeral service for Denis, which took place in All Saint's Church, Raheny, conducted by the Rector, the Reverend Kevin Ronné. I was privileged to be asked to offer the prayers and a few words of tribute to Denis. Sincere condolences are offered

to Alexandra and Gerald, Ian and Ann, grandchildren Ben, Jordan, Rachel and Hannah, granddaughter-in-law Anastasia, and the entire family circle. May Denis rest in peace and be raised in glory.

## **SWIFT SYMPOSIUM**

he 22nd International Swift Symposium was held in the Deanery on Saturday 19 October. The attendance of almost thirty delegates was indicative of a return to pre-pandemic numbers.

The guest speakers and delegates were welcomed by the Dean and the symposium was introduced by Professor Robert Mahony, Catholic University, Washington.

The speakers, and their subjects, respectively, were: Gabriella Hartvig, University of Pécs, Hungary, *The Contemporary reception of the Drapier's Letters in Newspapers*; James Ward, Ulster

University, Coleraine, The Drapier, the Viscount and the Slave: Swift, Molesworth and some modalities of bondage; Conrad Brunstrom, Maynooth University, Jonathan Swift and the weight of things; and Katarina O'Briain, York University, Toronto, Canada, The Drapier's Voice, the Bell-man's Cry. The response to the papers was delivered by Ruth Menzies, Aix-Marseille Université, Provence, France.

There were many compliments paid to the very fine, and well researched, sermon preached by the Prebendary of Tymothan, the Reverend Paul Willoughby, at the Commemorative Swift Evensong the next day.

Here is a selection of the latest updates from our Community Officer, Kelley Bermingham:

#### Church of Ireland Network

Sunday October 20th last I had the great privilege to be welcomed to Naas Deanery for lunch with before visiting St David's Naas by invitation of Canon Craig McCauley and the congregation there, to give the sermon for the Harvest Service on the theme of Mission Beyond the Walls. Discerning our gifts, and each other's, we have the opportunity to extend ourselves in ways that are placed within us by God. The words of Rt Rev & Rt Hon Dr Rowan Williams

resonated with the Gospel of Mark 'Split the wood and I am there, said the Unfamiliar Lord' living in, and living out what God has given to us and extending that to others by we living out His mission. Making our Church and community spaces welcoming, noticing the needs of those around us, responding to those needs, and doing what we can to remove the barriers to full participation in all that is on offer in life.

#### 'THE THREAD OF HOME' PROJECT UPDATE

In 2022, we were invited to apply for a grant to the Huguenot Society through the link with Vicky LaTouche-Price. We were successful in securing a grant of €6,000 which enabled the engagement of two artists Tuqa Al-Surraj and Laragh Pittman and project assistant, Eileen Mantel.

The project explores traditional Palestinian embroidery and its parallels with 17th-century French Huguenot weaving. Exiled artisans carried their crafts and cultural heritage into new homes, expressing their journey through

intricate patterns. these artisans captured the essence of their journeys, and the project invites participants to engage with these stories by creating their own embroidered pieces that reflect these rich historical narratives.

Through four workshops, participants use these motifs to explore heritage and identity. The project culminates in an exhibition at Saint Patrick's Cathedral on a date to be confirmed in 2025, fostering solidarity within the community bridging past and present struggles of displacement

and resilience.

Throughout the process, Huguenot descendant and artist, Mr Tommy Barr, has been a constant supporter, co-facilitator ally, champion of the project. He is also the author of 'Un Beau Refuge:Art from the legacy of the Huguenots'. We look forward to seeing what the new year will bring in approaching the completion of this phase of creative endeavour, deep exploration of threads, stories, homeplaces, new places, and connections – the patterns of lives lived, and all the complexity that this brings.



#### DUBLIN CITY PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK AND SECRETARIAT



elected to ellev has been Dublin City Public ►Participation Network as the Community Representative for a 2nd term since returning to work with the Cathedral. As the community re, Kelley is on the Local Community Development Committee who have been reviewing the Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme as well as developing the Local Economic and Community Plan. Multiple levels of consultation have taken place. The national PPN conference took place in Limerick with this year marking the 10th anniversary of the network.

Representatives from all over Ireland attended with workshops and programming filling the 2 days, and evening. An ideal opportunity to look beyond the capital to the wider needs, and to learn from eachother as well as connecting with other pillar



representatives. Kelley is also on the Secretariat for Dublin City which is the administrative arm and takes its direction from the Plenary (all of the Member Groups). Coming up in November is the Plenary for Dublin.
