

THE VERY REVD DR WILLIAM MORTON

he many friends in Saint Patrick's Cathedral of the Reverend Canon Brian McKay, one of our œcumenical Canons on the Chapter of The National Cathedral, wish to express to him their sincere condolences and prayerful support on the death of his dear sister, Patricia Josephine (Pat), to whom Canon Brian was so loyal and caring down the years.

Late of Seapark Drive, Clontarf, and Kildoon, Co Kildare, Pat died peacefully at Naas General Hospital on November 10th 2024, after a long illness. Her funeral mass was held in the Carmelite Church White Abbey, Kildare on Thursday 14th, which was followed by a service in Glasnevin Crematorium. The Dean's Vicar, Canon Charles Mullen, and Canon David Oxley, together with some members of staff from Saint Patrick's, were glad to be with Canon Brian for the funeral, having availed of transport using the

Cathedral mini-bus, driven by Kelley Bermingham. The Dean considered it an honour to be invited by Canon Brian to read from Holy Scripture at the service in Glasnevin.

Canon Brian, whom we assure of our continued thoughts and prayers, has asked that his sincere thanks be conveyed to all who expressed their condolences.

Sincere condolences are expressed as well to Ms Judith Lyons, classroom music teacher at Saint Patrick's Cathedral Choir School, and Choir supervisor, on the death of her mother, Denise Murnane Lyons. We remember also Damian and Vicky Bowers, on the death of Vicky's father, Michael Kealy; also Melissa Carton, a member of the Cathedral office staff in the Deanery basement, on the death of her father.

## A FRIENDLY CONVERSATION BEARS FRUIT

well-known face and voice in Ireland, who died in October, former TD Government Minister, Mary O'Rourke. Her death prompted me to tell the story of the one and only time I met the lady, and quite by chance at that. It was about 1999, just about two years after I had been appointed Dean of Saint Columb's Cathedral, Londonderry. I should point out that I inherited a situation whereby, just before Christmas in 1994, the cathedral was broken into and vandalized, the cross stolen from the altar, the bible from the lectern, and entry gained to the inside of the organ where those responsible trampled upon and smashed the pipes, and wrecked the instrument, leaving it totally unplayable.

No one was ever apprehended for the crime, and compensation was never forthcoming as the insurers insisted that the organ should have been insured on a separate policy (which would have been at excessive cost to the Cathedral) – just as in the case of an expensive ring or some other piece of jewellery.

For the last three years of his ministry before he retired, my predecessor, Dean Cecil Orr, strove valiantly to raise money to repair, restore, and - as they were advised at the time – to enlarge the organ. Disappointingly, it was to no avail whatsoever. Every application drew a blank.

One morning, however, when I walked into the cathedral who was standing there in a group of about six



or more people but the local MP for Foyle, Mark Durkan. Stepping out from the group, he came forward to greet me explaining that he had with him some politicians and officials from Dublin. He asked if I would like to meet them, and, when I said I would love to meet them, he beckoned them to come over. The first person to whom I was introduced was Minister Mary O'Rourke who was interested in finding out some information about the cathedral, and visitor numbers, and other relevant points. Mark then began to explain to her the dilemma I, and the Select Vestry of Saint Columb's, faced with regard to funding for the organ.

"You poor thing," she said, "that's a real worry for you." "Will you hold on a moment until I speak with my adviser?" When the young lady came over, the Minister, having re-iterated the problem to her: "Roisin, could we not help Dean Morton through the Department of Foreign Affairs? He has been saying to me that they have tours coming in here from Dublin, from Galway, Limerick, and other places too. Surely when it's cross-border, and bringing people into Northern Ireland, we could try and help him find a source of funding, particularly since the organ is being used for loads of musical events?" She went on: "Would you be able to meet with me when we're back in Dublin at the beginning of next week?"


The conversation with the Minister continued in which she assured me she would talk with the Minister for Foreign Affairs and get his department to make contact. I thanked her profusely, and we parted. I was heartened, but

unsure how it would turn out. After a few weeks an official from the Department of Foreign Affairs rang to arrange a visit and to meet with a small number of us from Saint Columb's. There was a great sense of enthusiasm on the part of the Irish Government to help us. Within the year we received a cheque for £100,000 Irish punts towards the organ restoration. This was an unbelievable response and one for which we shall be eternally grateful. The person who saw most of the process carried through was a gentleman called Ray Bassett who some years later was appointed as Irish Ambassador to Canada.

magnificent That donation, which was truly a major indication of confidence in the project, served as a catalyst towards other funding bodies contributing as well. The entire cost of repairs, restoration, and enlarging of the organ by the firm of Wells Kennedy from Lisburn, County Antrim was in the region of £550,000 and within little over a few years the entire sum was raised. The refurbished and enlarged organ, which started bring used for events for lots of cross-community, cross-border and cross-cultural events, in a remarkable way became an instrument of reconciliation.

It all started with a friendly conversation with Minister Mary O'Rourke. I had never met the lady before; and I never met her again. As President Mary McAleese wrote of her at the time of her passing, "Mary O'Rourke was an iconic politician, a lady who had a great capacity for friendship, kindness and encouragement." May she rest in peace and be raised in glory.


Of course India has its towering challenges which I do not need to enumerate here, but, even though my stay was short, I feel confident when I say that its glory are its people, manifest in

"The challenge of teaching over that period of time was exacerbated by the pandemic which beset us from March of 2020, but I'm glad to say we weathered it, although it did cause us, and society at large, many problems," said the Dean.

He went on: "Every teacher brings something unique to the classroom, and Ms McCormack has been part of many of our shared experiences. We'll remember the times spent together, and, as she moves on to new opportunities, we wish her all the best and hope she finds fulfilment in her future endeavours. We hope her next chapter brings her success and happiness."

Adding to the good wishes extended to Ms McCormack was Ms Fiona Fitzsimons, a member of the Board of Management of the Choir School, and former Chair of the Parents' Association. Fiona said that the Choir School is "a unique learning environment," and that Ms McCormack always put the children's welfare first.

She went on: "It was Ms McCormack who brought sports into the school. In 2017-2019 the school took part in Marathon Kids - four running sessions every week over eight weeks. As I work nearby, I found myself 'dragged in' to the training session. Jennifer, always with a smile on her face and a laugh in her voice, doesn't take no for an answer. That tenacity was evident when she negotiated



with the DCC Sports Officer so that students in the Choir School learned to row and to kayak."

Mr Pearce Maloney, deputy principal, added his thanks to Ms McCormack, and wished her well for the future, as did Mr Gavan Woods, CEO of Saint Patrick's Cathedral, and also a member of the Choir School's Board of Management.

## Delgany Parish Visit: The Most Fun you can Have in Dublin

aint Patrick's Cathedral sponsors a number of local outreach projects and initiatives in Dublin 8. They have given away more than a million euro in the last few years. This has been raised from visitors' donations while lighting prayer candles - not a particularly Anglican tradition but it obviously strikes a chord with visitors and it yields an impressive result for good causes.

The Cathedral is a landmark in the city and is visited by more than 600,000 visitors each year, not counting those who come to daily or Sunday services. 94% of these are international visitors and tourists. The other 6% are more local but, of these, how many are members of the Church of Ireland parishes to whom, in a sense, this cathedral of the Church of Ireland belongs?

To make the parishes more aware of what the Cathedral has to offer,

the Cathedral Board came up with a brilliant idea. They offer a guided tour to parish groups, Mothers' Union branches or other organisations, collect them from the Dart or other convenient starting point and give them VIP access to the Cathedral and its attractions. Then they will bring you home or back to your starting point. No worries about traffic or parking or security - and no entry fee. It is all free of charge!

On a Tuesday afternoon in October, a group organised by Delgany Parish Mothers' Union took the Cathedral up on its offer. A Dart from Greystones to Tara Street, collection by minibus and an escort into the Cathedral.

There is plenty to see. Even if you have been before, many years ago, you will be surprised by how bright the Cathedral has become. The regimental flags are still there, deteriorating gently year by year. The beautiful altar frontals and fine statues of aristocracy and Church dignitaries are still there but so too are

more recent additions, prayer trees and a fine sculpture of St Patrick by Melanie Le Brocquy.

We saw the boar's head and the cannonball, the 'chance your arm' door and we looked for the deliberate mistake in the floor tiling. (Only God makes everything perfectly).

Our guide, Kryzel, told us the stories of Dean Jonathan Swift and translated the Latin epitaph which Swift modestly wrote for himself. He was a man who liked to have the last word! We saw his death masks and the very modest pulpit he used when preaching. His sermons were said to be 2 to 3 hours long which makes our modern clergy's preaching seem ridiculously brief! We asked questions, all of which were expertly answered.



What was the best bit? The magnificent architecture, superb needlework on frontals and beautiful stained-glass windows were a11 outstanding. The overall sense of a magnificent building that has been a house of prayer for more than 800 years, with its tombs of Norman archbishops and connections to every period of Irish history in that time, is impressive indeed. I liked the Dean's Chair, made from original Cathedral roof timbers, dating from 1190 but I suppose we all had our own favourites.

The person who really made the day special was Kelley Bermingham, who works as Community Officer for the Cathedral and was our driver and overall guide for the day. Kelley's local knowledge of the cathedral and surrounding area of Dublin 8 and her information and commentary on all the sights we saw from the minibus windows was truly outstanding. Her enthusiasm was infectious but she has worked in the area on various social projects and she is also realistic about the problems and deprivations of inner city life. She has an impressive track record for social action, both by her own efforts and in her family. Her father, Willie Bermingham, founded the charity 'Alone'.

I felt as if I was seeing the city and the Cathedral through her eyes, for the first time, almost like visiting a foreign city. And I am a Dubliner, born and bred.

So thank you Kelley and Cathedral staff for a great day out – the most fun you can have in Dublin.

He ran to the window and looked out.


